"Walking with the Lord"

How to Use This Booklet: Pick a quiet time each day during Lent for devotion. Start with a prayer. Then it is important to read the Bible passage before proceeding. The authors of these devotional messages assume that the Bible passages will have been read first, because the messages refer back to the Bible passage on the daily devotional page. Then reflect on what you have read and end with a prayer. It is a five-step process: Pray, read the Bible passage, read the message for that day, reflect and discuss, then close with a prayer. It is our hope that this devotional booklet will be a blessing to you each day of Lent. As you read each daily page, remember that you are connected to the author of each page through the fellowship of the Holy Spirit.

About This Booklet: This year we once again reached out to members and friends of The Little Church on the Prairie and Lakewood*grace* to write a page for this booklet. Our theme for this year is: **Walking with the Lord.**

It is hoped that each contributor to this booklet will gain from the experience. It is also hoped that each person who uses this booklet will be moved to a deeper relationship with Jesus, will become a better disciple, and will be motivated to bring the good news of Jesus to others, showing the love of Jesus to all.

About the Lenten Season: The term "Lent" comes from an Old English word that means springtime. The Lenten season is a time for spiritual preparation for Easter by remembering the suffering, death, and resurrection of Christ. Lent is the period between Ash Wednesday and Easter. The Lenten spiritual disciplines such as prayer, alms giving, and fasting are meant to help us realize our dependency on God for everything, and to prepare our hearts to hear what God will say to us. May our Lord bless your spiritual journey this Lenten season.

Ash Wednesday, February 14, 2024

Walking With the Lord: The Story of Enoch

READ: Genesis 5:22, 24; Hebrews 11:5

OPENING THOUGHT: The Bible reveals that because of Enoch's faith walk was pleasing to God, that God took him; meaning that God carried him across the river of death and placed him on the other side. Enoch didn't experience death.

MEDITATION: About 50 years ago, I recall a heartwarming story about Enoch's walk with God. Over many years, I have retold it to my kids, and grandkids numerous times. They all loved it. This story is a big part of me. It goes like this:

One day, Enoch was sitting on his porch swing pondering what following God meant. Then unexpectedly, the Lord came down the road and asked Enoch if he wanted to take a walk with Him. Enoch got up and answered, "Yes Lord."

So, they walked and talked. Enoch learned of God's love, grace, forgiveness, and expectations. Enoch became very encouraged. When Enoch got home, he said to himself, 'Was not my heart burning within me when the Lord was speaking with me on the road?"

Then every day thereafter the Lord would come by about the same time and say to Enoch, "Let's take a walk." Enoch would wait with anticipation and always say, "Yes Lord". One day the Lord asked, "Enoch, how would like to go on a very long walk with Me?" Enoch replied. "Yes Lord". So, they walked and talked losing track of time. Finally, Enoch said, "Lord, it's late, getting dark and I am a long way from my home, I need to go back." The Lord said, "Enoch, because of your faith, you are a lot closer to my home than yours. Come on home with me."

CLOSING THOUGHT: In my life, I have seen many of my friends and family pass away. I also have faced significant issues that you all have faced. When I am in the stormes of life, I remember Enoch's walk of faith. (Heb 11:6) "Without faith, it's impossible to please God". Remember, God will bring us home also.

Although we will never meet during our earthly lives, we have woven an enduring cord of friendship through letters, pictures and packages and we thank God for it in every letter.

First Sunday in Lent, February 18, 2024

TITLE: Walk in God's Light

READ: 1 John 1:7-9

Tuesday, February 20, 2024

TITLE: The Christ that Others Can See

READ: 2 Corinthians 4:6, Ephesians 2:10

Opening Prayer: Lord Jesus, thank you for shining your light into our hearts, that we may radiate your glory and walk in your light as your handiwork. May we shine YOU today. Amen.

Meditation: Light always has a purpose. Of its many uses includes to cheer, warm, brighten and illuminate. However, the most important is to allow for vision.

Six million cones and 120 million rods. That's how many photoreceptors are in our retina. Eight million variations of color. That's how many shades of color we can detect through our vision. Every waking moment, these receptors capture photons of light and convert the light energy into electric signals that travel to the brain and form images which allow us to see. The marvel of the human eye, which closely resembles a camera, also serves as unspeakably powerful evidence for the existence of our Creator God.

The same God who created the human eye to receive light also describes himself as the Light of the world (John 8:12). Even more amazingly, Jesus also calls *us* "the light of the world" (Matthew 5:14-16). The parallel in wording and directness of the claim is unmistakable. In following Jesus's footsteps, we are meant to be like him; we are to BE the light and what do we illuminate? What do others see when we shine? We brighten Christ to those around us. We literally *shine Christ*. That is the incredible and beautiful calling of being a Christian, a disciple of Jesus, a follower of Christ, the Light of the World.

When Christ shines in our hearts, we become the Light of Christ, radiating the Lord. Receiving his light energy, we are transformed into signals that travel out to those around us to allow them to see Christ. The marvel of the Christian who walks in the light thus closely resembles a camera. We become walking, living, talking pictures of the God we encounter. We become the unspeakably powerful evidence for the existence of our Savior.

CLOSING THOUGHT: How can I shine Christ to others around me today? Jinshil Yi

TITLE: Walk in God's Light

READ: Psalm 119:105, John 3:21

Peter reminds us to make the rest of our lives about this.

CLOSING THOUGHT: Often, in our fast-paced lives, we forget the importance of showing love, gratitude and hospitality. It's easy to let the fatigue set in and take over. When this happens, I have to stop, take a deep breath and remember what God has promised us. Perhaps I'm so feeble, I need to walk the race, remembering the house with a table the Lord has prepared for me when I reach Heaven.

READ: John 13:34-35

Tuesday, February 27, 2024

TITLE: Walk By Faith

READ: Mark 5:25-34, Mal 4:2

OPENING PRAYER: Our Father, help us to walk in your ways by faith. Amen.

MEDITATION: The book of John concludes with the following statement, "But there are also many other things Jesus did; and if they were all to be recorded, I don't think the whole world could contain the books that would have to be written". The implication is that those things that *were* recorded are essential to our faith. Today's reading is a great case in point.

Jesus healed many in His short time on earth and by many methods. In today's reading, he was essentially passive—the woman touched the 'hem' of Jesus' garment and was healed. Then, Jesus tells her, "Daughter, your faith has healed you". Clearly, she had faith, but faith in what exactly? Was it faith that Jesus' could heal her of her ailment, or was it faith in something much more?

Numbers 15:37-41 is part of the 'shema'—one of the central daily prayers for Jews both then and now. These verses describe the commandment to tie fringes ('tzitzit' in Hebrew) on the corners ('kanaf' in Hebrew) of their garments. Jesus, of course, kept this commandment, and in fact, the 'tzitzit' on the 'kanaf' of Jesus' garment is exactly what the woman in our reading stretched out and grabbed—immediately before being healed. Did she inadvertently grab the corner of Jesus' garment, or was she intentional?

I believe the reading from Malachi gives us reason to believe that the woman grabbed the corner of Jesus' garment purposefully, because of who she believed Jesus' was. She believed that Jesus' was much more than just a good rabbi. Malachi, states that 'the sun of righteousness (one of the many different titles for the Messiah) will rise with healing in its wings' ('kanaf' in Hebrew). The word 'kanaf' links the Number's text to the messianic Malachi text. The woman understood the Malachi text to mean that the coming Messiah was to have healing in the corner of his garments. Acting on her faith that Christ would heal, she got close enough to Jesus to touch the corner (wings) of his garment and was healed!

CLOSING THOUGHT: God's word is the foundation of our faith—we need to read it, and then act on it.

TITLE: A Commendable Faith

READ: Hebrews 11:1, 6

OPENING PRAYER: Lord, please give me understanding as I seek inspiration and guidance from your word.

MEDITATION: FAITH is an over-arching theme in lots of Bible studies as it should be—it's a pretty big deal! We all want to be right with God. As I pondered how I would describe faith, I boiled it down to this: faith is seeking to live a life that is pleasing to God. The guys mentioned in this passage weren't trying to win points with God. They were merely living their lives as "sure" and "certain" men - **sure** of things hoped for and **certain** of things not seen. Abel pleased God by presenting a thank offering that was choice and generous when compared to his brother Abel's almost obligatory offering. God knows our hearts. We can't hide our motives from him. Is our motivation for our gain or for his?

Enoch, another man of deep faith, is the only one in his lineage who is singled out for having "walked with God." These two Heroes of the Faith believed God existed and earnestly sought him. If we are right with God, we don't have to plan or strategize our thoughts or words or actions toward God and others. They will be an automatic response to God's goodness and faithfulness to us. A word the passage uses repeatedly is "commended." Abel was commended as a righteous man and Enoch was commended as one who pleased God. Wow! What an honor!

I'm pretty sure I am not commendable yet, but I am trying to live a life that pleases God by sharing his love and by honoring and loving his people.

CLOSING THOUGHT: God, I am inspired by these ordinary people with extraordinary faith. May my heart be fertile ground for me to hear your voice and seek your will. Thank you. Amen.

TITLE: Walk by Faith

READ: Mark 9:23-24

OPENING PRAYER: Lord, open our eyes of our heart to see your promises.

MEDITATION: This is one of the most poignant passages in the Bible. A desparate father pleads with Jesus to heal his son after the disciples tried and failed. He doesn't quite get it right though. CLOSING THOUGHT: During what seem to be the good times, we need to remember that even though our lives may not appear to be desperate, in God's eyes, our sin and our world are in a desperate place. Remember to reach out to him, reflecting the true desperation of our situation and ask God to help in our unbelief.

TITLE: Walk Not with the Wicked, But with Discernment

READ: Proverbs 13:20, 1 Corinthians 15:33

OPENING PRAYER: Dear Heavenly Father, we seek your guidance as we embark on this moment of reflection. May your boundless love and wisdom fill our hearts with unwavering faith, Amen.

MEDITATION: In this Lenten season, we reflect on the profound impact of our church. The Apostle Paul reminds us that our companions shape our character. Proverbs 13:20 reinforces this wisdom, stating that "walk with the wise and become wise, for a companion of fools suffers harm."

Consider the story of young David and Jonathan whose friendship was rooted in faith and mutual respect. Their bond strengthened both spiritually and personally, inspiring courage and loyalty. Yet, we must also acknowledge the cautionary tales of those who walked with ungodly companions leading to moral compromise and spiritual drift. The choices we make about our relationships can profoundly influence our journey of faith.

His prayers are that God would fill them up fully, so that they can meet that tall order. So that they can walk the walk that is a life worthy of the Lord.

CLOSING THOUGHT: Father, help us remember that you are enough. When we don't feel worthy, help us turn to you for validation and not the standards of this world.

Only in this way—by recognizing and embracing our dependency on Jesus for life—can we live and become fruitful. No matter how good a flower in the vase may look, it will wilt and wither because it is already dead. But the flower on the living vine becomes fruit and thus the vector of new life—even as the vine is still the source of that life.

CLOSING THOUGHT: So, stay connected! Let Jesus' resurrection life renew and restore you—and let him bring you to fruitfulness!

CLOSING PRAYER: As the deer pants for the water, so my soul longs after You. You alone are my heart's desire. And I long to worship You.
